- 5 minute diagnostic obstetric ultrasound scan

The primary aim of the scan is to utilise ultrasound technology to produce ultrasound findings for the purpose of diagnosis and prevention with regard to the well-being of mother and fetus (baby)

A bit more information...

Please ensure that you are over 16 weeks as defined by your due date? Gender identification cannot be offered before this stage.

- Our sonographer will carry out a well-being check before we do anything else. They will check the following:
 - They'll confirm whether you're having one baby or more than one.
 - They'll complete a number of scan processes in order to check for the presence of some abnormalities. Our Fetal Abnormality Policy details the checks that we will undertake and a copy of this is available should you wish to see it.
 - They'll let you hear and see your baby's heartbeat but please be aware that we follow national guidelines and don't spend a lot of time focussing on the developing heart.
 - They'll observe the amount of amniotic fluid.
 - They'll check your baby's body and limb movements.
 - They'll check the position of your baby and your placenta.
 - They'll give you a professional opinion of the gender of your baby after looking from 3 angles. We'll tell you if we are sure from the views that we are able to get.
- Your sonographer will openly discuss the findings of your scan with you and you will receive a Wellbeing Report which is your record of the scan.
- We will need mum and dad's first name and your due date
- PLEASE BE AWARE THAT ALTHOUGH WE WILL DO OUR VERY BEST TO RELIABLY IDENTIFY THE GENDER OF YOUR BABY AND OUR SUCCESS RATE IS EXCEPTIONALLY HIGH, WE CAN NEVER BE 100% CERTAIN UNTIL YOUR BABY HAS DEVELOPED A LITTLE MORE.
